

It's hard to


believe that we are 15 years old.



The Roots of Pride Protest

The existence of LGBTQIA+ and people with gender variance is as old as humanity itself. We have existed across the world within all societies and cultures. There are examples from the indigenous people of North America to the Aztecs and Mayans where gender variance or same sex relations were universally accepted. However, the labels and identities we attach to such people, such as gay or lesbian, have been developed and become more common in recent history.

The concept of Pride and related events has also evolved more recently, and to understand its importance and significance and continued relevance we need to honour its roots in the uprising led by trans women of colour in 1969 after a police raid on a West Village gay bar in New York - The Stonewall Inn.

This was a watershed moment in LGBTQIA+ history. It took another three years until the UK's first Pride march was held in London on 1 July 1972. This date was chosen as the nearest Saturday to the anniversary

of Stonewall Riots.


The rights that have been won in some countries come against a backdrop of continuing high levels of homophobia and rising levels of transphobia. In over 50 countries, a conviction for homosexuality can get you a jail sentence up to life. In Norwich and across the UK we have seen far right groups mobilise and spread their hatred towards the LGBTQIA+ community and particularly drag story-time events. We will never tire of

mobilising and standing in opposition to the far right to support our wonderful drag community.

Global Pride - Unity is Strength

Pride events take place
annually in many countries
across the world. Over 1
million people attended
London Pride in 2022, and
the largest regional Prides
such as Manchester and
Brighton continue to attract
hundreds of thousands.
Across East Anglia many

Pride events take place now and Norwich Pride tries to spread the word about these.

We celebrate gains for the LGBTQIA+ movement. for example international progress in Cuba, Andorra and Slovenia as well as more directly by donating to equivalent Ukrainian organisations via the European Pride Organisation Association (EPOA) #StandWithUkraine campaign. We also commemorate and mourn victims of hatred, for example by working with key activists in the trans community to collectively stand against hate, such supporting the vigil following the tragic murder of Brianna Ghey.

Evolution of the Rainbow Flag

In 1978, San Francisco artist Gilbert Baker created a rainbow flag to meet the LGBTQIA+ community's need for an enduring symbol that could be used each year at the city's Pride march. The idea took off and rainbows have been used to represent the LGBTQIA+ community ever since.

The flag has also evolved, and the Progress Pride flag was developed in 2018 by non-binary American artist and designer Daniel Quasar (who uses xe/xyr pronouns). Based on the iconic rainbow flag from 1978, the redesign celebrates the

diversity of the LGBTQIA+ community and calls for a more inclusive society. For Quasar, the light blue, pink and white stripes represent trans and non-binary individuals, and the brown and black ones represent marginalised People of Colour (POC) communities. The black stripe has a double meaning as it is also intended for "those living with AIDS and the stigma and prejudice surrounding them, and those who have been lost to the disease". More recently the yellow

Intersex symbol has been added to the flag to ensure greater inclusivity.

Why Our History is Important

The 2021 Census results from households showed that Norwich has the highest number of bisexual people in England and



Wales. The overall levels of visibility of the LGBTQIA+ people in the census really heartened many people and made some feel less isolated. Norwich Pride has been supporting others to ensure that our history is conserved, for example by working with the local LGBTQIA+ History Group, and the Queer Norfolk Project that is digitalising history and ensuring it is accessible to all.

How You Can Help **Create History - Be a** Part of Norwich Pride

LGBTQIA+ politics is always evolving; it is never fixed.

Norwich Pride became a charity in 2019, to ensure that our structure and accounts are transparent. We are regulated by the Charity Commission and are accountable to deliver our charity objectives. While we recognise that LGBTQIA+ people have made gains in legal recognition and rights over the last 50 years in many countries, this

'progress' is uneven and is never linear.

As we have seen in the UK, since the end of the discriminatory Section 28 legislation and the introduction of same sex marriage, attacks on trans rights have increased. The notion that trans rights are 'up for debate' will never be accepted by Norwich Pride.

The struggle continues join us to help create a more equal world.

In celebration of Norwich Pride's 15th anniversary, we want to honor how pride began... a protest.

When the Stonewall riots erupted in 1969, gay prides began popping up all over the US and Europe. Although now we think of pride as a celebration of the queer community, a time to come together and fly the flag for the LGBTQIA+ population, pride has and always should be revered as a protest. As Norwich Pride, we strive to continue our work in protecting the rights and lives of LGBTQIA+ people no matter their background, and to this day fight for queer revolution.

For Norwich Pride's annual exhibition, we chose the theme queer activism history with the title 'Revolting'. We asked artists to respond to this theme by looking to their queer history, community, and experiences relating to demonstrations, protests, and politics. This could be historic events such as Section 28, the AIDS crisis, and the marriage equality act. It could also be more recent events such as conversion therapy, 'the trans debate', and the increase in violent hate crimes.

As an exhibition highlighting marginalised experiences, we welcomed submissions from all members of the LGBTQIA+ community, especially those with intersecting identities such as

people of colour, disabled people, those identifying as transgender, nonbinary, and gender non-conforming, and those with lived experience of the historic events mentioned. We were to see submissions from artists using a range of materials including painting, photography, sculpture, printmaking, illustration, filmmaking, textiles, and performance art.

We're proud to announce our partnership with Queer Norfolk, a grassroots volunteer-led project based at Norfolk Heritage Centre which aims to hand ownership of queer collections back to communities and empower people to access, discover, and contribute to collections that reflect their shared histories. This partnership integrates historic objects such as protest signs, AIDS crisis memorabilia, and Section 28 ephemera. These objects are displayed amongst the artworks to bring context and remind us of the roots that came from the activist work of generations before us.


We are very grateful to The Assembly House, and The Assembly House Trust for hosting the exhibition, and to Norwich University of the Arts for their incredible support.


What about the drawer of forgotten favourites?

bend and twist our limbs to make us fit, but we won't.



Pollyanna's story

"My mum Jennie collapsed suddenly in 2017. I arrived at A&E to be told the worst news, mum had suffered a cerebral haemorrhage and it was very unlikely that she would recover with any quality of life.

"My Mum was fiercely independent and loved to have fun – I knew I had to let her go. I remembered that mum had carried a donor card, so it was easy for me to say yes to organ

"I was given plenty of time to say goodbye; handprints and a lock of her hair were given to

"I was thrilled to find out that a gentleman in his 50s received a kidney, as did a lady in her 60s. Mum also donated heart and eye tissue.

"It gives me comfort to think that my worst day was someone else's best."

It only takes two minutes to join the NHS Organ Donor Register and each donor could save or improve up to nine lives.

Currently over 7000 people are actively waiting for an organ transplant across the UK, just like Tim was.



Tim's story

"At the age of 15 tests revealed I had the signs of early chronic kidney failure.

"By 25, my results were showing that I needed to start dialysis. I was also placed on the organ transplant waiting list.

"A month before my 30th birthday, I got the call I was waiting for, a suitable donor organ had been found! I was soon back at home, incredibly thankful for the amazing gift.

"Seven years later I needed to be put back onto dialysis. I needed another kidney transplant. Around nine months later I got a call to say that, again, an organ had come up which would suit me.

"So, I sit here now with a perfectly functioning second kidney transplant! I am so thankful for everything I have.

"It has absolutely been the ultimate gift."


